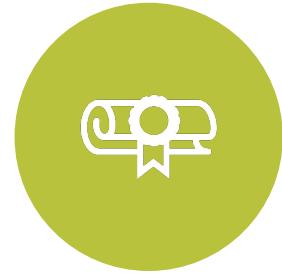
What We're Learning: Collective Assessment Findings



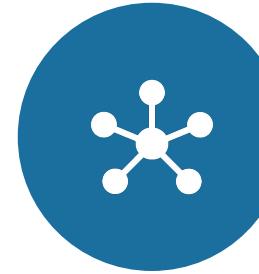
15 orgs assessed



Strong in: Policy revisions, outreach



Gaps in: Inclusive hiring, mentorship, alignment on EDI goals



Weak communication/collaboration infrastructure

What We're Learning: Training Needs Assessment Findings

- Training has momentum, but gaps persist
- Experience & leadership level shape needs
- Barriers are structural and cultural
- Training preferences emphasize flexibility
- Many feel training is too generic, not led by people with lived experience, or fails to lead to meaningful change.

Top skills requested

- Communication
- Community Engagement
- Self-awareness & Reflection
- Skills like data & evaluation, facilitation, and advocacy are undervalued

What This Means



Libraries are ready but need better-designed pathways that meet people where they are.



We should center community engagement and implementation support, not just awareness.



There's clear demand for training that goes beyond surface-level EDI to address power, policy, and practice.

Breaking Barriers: Challenges and Solutions

Common Barriers We've Identified:

- Lack of leadership buy-in, competing priorities
- Limited funding, time constraints, expertise gaps
- Communication silos, coordination challenges
- Political pressures, community resistance

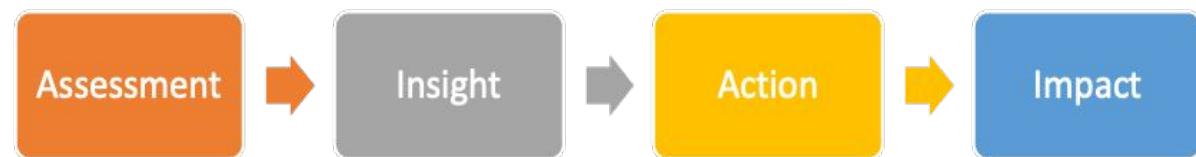
Our Solutions Framework:

- Assessment: Individual and institutional tools for benchmarking progress
- Capacity Building: Training, toolkits, expert guidance
- Community of Practice: Monthly meetings, peer support
- Resource Sharing: Centralized hub, speakers database
- Collective Action: Coordinated initiatives, shared messaging

EDI-NJ Statewide Equity, Diversity & Inclusion Assessment Tool

This statewide tool supports NJ libraries in reflecting on, benchmarking, and advancing EDI efforts across seven key operational areas:

- Collections & Resources
- Programs & Services
- Community Engagement
- Workforce Development
